


# Financial Statements for the Year Ending 30 June 2023

# TREASURER'S REPORT

Women in Aid and Development (WiAD) commenced operation as an Incorporated Association in December 2019 and has grown consistently since that time despite the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, with cancellation of many face-to-face events and a change to a hybrid business model. Face-to-face events have resumed state by state but the option of online attendance has continued.

The result for the 2023 financial year was a surplus of \$2,194,which consisted of \$18,551 in revenue against expenditure of \$16,357. The membership base has continued to grow which is reflected in the income and to support this growth into the future WiAD has continued to invest significantly in the development of its CRM system. In fact, the largest expense items were related to IT representing 63% of total costs: CRM costs (\$7,547), IT support (\$1,732) and web hosting (\$1,071). WiAD has managed to significantly reduce venue costs due to pairing with providers offering sites at minimal to no cost which was a deliberate strategy employed in 2023 due to high venue costs in 2022. Other costs were consistent with the previous year.





The association had a positive equity position at the end of the year of \$9,768 with a cash balance of \$8,897 with prepayments of \$1,222 and total liabilities of 1,821 which represents income in advance for prepaid membership fees of \$1,821.

In signing off the annual accounts, WiAD's Directors have certified that they believe that the accounts have been prepared accurately and present a fair view of the association's financial position and performance. The Directors are also certifying that the organisation can pay its liabilities when they are due.

According to the requirements of NSW Fair Trading (the regulator for WiAD), WiAD is small enough so as not to require an audit, so no audit report has been provided with the financial statements.

The financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023 are submitted for approval by the members at the AGM. If approved, the Chair will then lodge the annual return with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) that will note that the accounts have been tabled.

#### 2022-2023 NETWORKING EVENTS OVERVIEW

July 2022 - Climate Change in the Aid, Development and Humanitarian Context - Climate change is the biggest challenge facing current and future generations. The world's poorest people and communities will feel its impacts the hardest, as they have lower capacity to deal with damage from more volatile weather, rising sea levels, more frequent natural disasters, food insecurity and habitat loss.

October 2022 - New Technologies in the Aid, Development & Humanitarian Sector - New and emerging technologies have enabled significant development progress over the decades – from vaccines to mobile phones to the internet. The UN recently called for improvement in this area, arguing that it is 'critical to assess how technology can be mobilized to provide solutions to our greatest challenges' in achieving the Global Goals.

December 2022 – **Reflecting on 2022** - Plans in 2022 were interrupted --- we all experienced this, but everyone found a different path – a Masters was finished at a desk instead of in the field, a new role found when one was lost, a return to Australia offered new roles.

February/March 2023 – Cracking the Code for a Gender Neutral Future - This years theme highlights the role that innovative, transformative ideas, inclusive technologies and accessible education in the digital age can play in combatting discrimination and marginalisation and so achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls, combatting discrimination and the marginalisation of women globally.

This years International Women's Day Theme "#EmbraceEquity" highlighted the need to get the world talking about why equal opportunities are not enough. True inclusion and belonging requires equitable action.

May 2023 – **Peacebuilding and Peacekeeping** - Peacebuilding is the guiding principle of international intervention with the objective of conflict prevention and/or resolution activities performed by either the UN, other international organisations, or groups and individuals at a community level. It aims to establish a self-sustaining peace that encompasses more than just an absence of violence or a return to armed conflict. It is a multifaceted project that involves implementing a range of reconstruction and reform efforts in countries with some of the most fragile, fluid, and unpredictable political environments.

#### MENTORING PROGRAM

We know the importance of mentors in achieving professional success and the value of securing career advice that is informed by experience and expertise. The Women in Aid & Development Mentoring Program is designed to match mentors with mentees and provide that support and encouragement to women working in the sector or planning to work in the sector. Our aim is to help shape a career that shows promise by learning from experienced and knowledgeable people who have walked in the same shoes and who are willing to guide the next generation of leaders and innovators. Women in Aid & Development offers three levels in our mentoring program designed to provide support for different stages of a career. The three levels were developed to match the most common requests of women in the sector.

#### **Information Session**

Our first Mentoring Workshop provided an overview of the program for both Mentors and Mentees. It provided information on matching process, expectations, confidentiality, and plans for development of the program. Feedback was universally positive.

#### **Small Group Workshops**

For those who are still studying or wanting to move from the NFP or the corporate sectors mentoring takes place in a small group environment with 3-4 people at a time. Two sessions have been held with excellent feedback and suggestions for enhancement. We plan to deliver workshops on *Creating a Professional CV & Cover Letter* and one on *Creating a Professional LinkedIn Profile*.


Vivian Chordi Director and Mentoring Committee



# Applying to be a Member

Becoming a member is easy. Simply complete the member form and send it to the Secretary by email or mail. Once received the board will review and approve your membership and the Secretary will inform you of the outcome and add your name to the membership register when they receive notification that you have paid the applicable Membership fee.

### **General Membership**

Open to all individuals aged 18 and over, who support the Objects of the Association, pay the General Membership fee annually, have been accepted by the board as a member, and whose name appears on the Member register.

- You are entitled to attend two Face to Face Women in Aid & Development networking sessions, each calendar year, AT NO COST.
- Apply to Volunteer in a number of roles including on the Event leadership Committee and participate in planning and presenting events in your city.
- Eligible to participate in the mentoring program when you have been a member for three months or more once every three years.
- Receive an annual report and an invitation to attend annual member meetings by teleconference
  where the annual report and financial reports are presented. You are NOT eligible to vote at
  general meetings of members or stand for election or accept any elected office within the
  Association.

#### **Voting Membership**

Open to all individuals aged 18 and over, who support the objects of the Association, pay the Voting Membership fee annually, have been accepted by the board as a member, and whose name appears on the Member register.

- You are entitled to all benefits above plus:
- You are eligible to Vote on any resolution or matter at a general meeting and to stand for election and accept any elected office within the Association

# **Organisational Membership**

Open to all Organisations active in the Aid, Development, Humanitarian and NFP Sectors, Managing Contractors and Universities educating Students in these areas, which support the objects of the Association, pay the Organisational Membership fee annually, have been accepted by the board as a member, and whose name appears on the Member register.

- Organisations are entitled to send FOUR staff members to attend Women in Aid & Development networking sessions, each quarter, AT NO COST.
- Staff Members are eligible to apply to Volunteer in a number of roles including on the Event leadership Committee and participate in planning and presenting events in your city.
- Two staff members are eligible to participate as a Mentee in the mentoring program each year.
- Unlimited staff members are eligible to participate as Mentors in the mentoring program.

- The Organisation will receive an annual report and an invitation to attend and take part in discussion at general meetings of members and nominate a person to vote at the election on behalf of the organisation.
